# A Fonkert Hoeksche Waard Sojourn: A Silver Baptismal Bowl and an 11<sup>th</sup> Cousin!




Oud-Cromstrijensedijk Oostzijde 3, Klaaswaal

This story of the Hoeksche Waard Fonkerts grows out of several trips to the Netherlands. Our entire family first visited in 1993. I returned a couple of years later. My brother Todd and I toured the Hoeksche Waard in 2003, and Barb and I returned in 2022.

The Hoeksche Waard is a partially man-made island between the Oude Maas and the Hollands Diep — streams in the Rhine-Maas delta. Diking and drainage of the flood prone marshy land began in the mid-1500s and continued into the early 1600s. Born across the Oude Maas in Rhone, Dirck Fonckert farmed near Westmaas by about 1600.

## Prologue -- 1993



As we drove along the Molendijk into Klaaswaal in 1993, we saw this sign for a small appliance and electronics shop.

A man was locking up. I pointed at the sign and said "Fonkert." I pointed at myself and said "Fonkert uit Amerika." The man motioned for me to follow him down the street.

A few doors down, we entered the Fonkert bicycle shop, walked through a door in the back, and entered the home of Rokus Fonkert.







Rokus reached for a 3-ring binder on a shelf above the couch. It was a Fonkert family history compiled by his nephew. I had no Dutch. Rokus had no English, but he called his daughter to help translate. We weren't able to determine our relationship, but Rokus gave us contact info for his nephew.


Three months later I received a letter from the nephew. Rokus and I were 11<sup>th</sup> cousins!

Klaaswaal had been a surprise, but we knew that Fonkerts had lived along the Vliet canal a mile or so west of Westmaas in the 17<sup>th</sup>-century.

We drove a triangle, stopping at a couple of farms to ask about Fonkerts. No luck. The road crossed a waterway hardly worthy of a name, but a farmhouse along the small canal was promising.

I knocked on the door. A woman answered. After several minutes struggling with the language barrier, she seemed to recognize the name Fonkert.

She went back inside and returned with a fat notebook – the history of the farm. The first owner was Dirck Adrianesz Fonckert, who lived there in 1610.

Klaaswaal is a special place in Fonkert family history. The 1610 house of Dirck Fonckert still stands on the Smidsweg just west of Westmaas. By the 1700s, Fonkerts had moved west toward Greup and Klaaswaal. Pieter and Wouter Fonkert, who emigrated to Pella about 1870, lived a couple of miles west along the Zinkweg.


Klaaswaal was first mentioned in 1555 as "Claes Wael" – a deep puddle created by a dike breach by someone named Claes during construction of the Oud Cromstrijen dike. The lords reserved land for a new village – Claeswaal – and a church was built in 1566.

More on Klaaswaal in a bit.

We went back to our hotel in Oud Beijerland. I left Barb and the girls at the hotel and drove down the Zinkweg in search of other Fonkert houses – yes, I knew what I was looking for.

A researcher in the Netherlands had prepared a Fonkert family history for my 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin, Phyllis Good. It described two Fonkert farmhouses at the intersection of the Zinkweg and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Kruisweg.

I found them.

Zegert Dirksz Fonkert owned a house on the south side of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Kruisweg as early as 1730. This house appears to have been built in 1900, when Nelia Jannetje Fonkert was 24 years old. The house was still standing in 2022, but it was badly deteriorated.





When my brother and I visited in 2003, there was a plaque on a small arch bridge between the road and the house stating that Dirk Fonkert Dzn laid the first tone in 1856. The plaque was not visible when Barb and I visited in 2022.



In 2022, trees and bushes had grown up and obscured the aging house, whose exterior was being renovated.



This is the house just north of the Kruisweg. Of special interest is the "cornerstone" high on the wall on the north side of the house. This house, built in 1858, may have replaced an earlier house because Pieter Dirksz Fonkert had a house on this property in 1810. The house was still standing in 2022, but it was showing its age.

I talked with the owner in 1993. He was not a Fonkert, but he directed me about a mile back up the road to the home of Aart Fonkert. We had a nice visit, and we exchanged Christmas cards for several years.

We're still in 1993... I drove back to the hotel, and who was there in the restaurant with Barb, Claudia, and Deb, but the woman I had visited with at the farm we had visited earlier in the afternoon. She had brought along with her a local historian who gave us photocopies of photos of the interior of Dirck Fonckert's house – not the house you saw a few slides ago, but the original house that had been converted to a garage – at far right in photo at left.



How did Mrs. Quartel find us? She must have called around to local hotels to find where we were staying.


The Westmaas mill and church spire viewed from Marienhof.






I want this book!









We visited Marienhof in May 2022. Mevrouw Quartel's daughter was very busy serving customers, but she allowed us to view the back room. Alas, there is a 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, but we have not seen it. You see, the story is that Dirck's house was originally home to priests, suggesting it might have been built by the late 1500s.

The present Westmaas church was built in 1650, but in the floor from the earlier structure is the grave of Dirck Adrianesz Fonckert, who died in 1641. I have visited the church, I think, three times, and a corner of the grave has always been covered by the choir.




The 1621 grave of Dirck's first wife was reputedly also in the floor of the earlier church, but we have not seen it.

Just in case you wondered... Dirck's daughter, Haesgen (aka Hassje) married Symon Huygen Splinter. She is buried a couple of miles up the road at Mijnsleerenland.

Dirck Adriaensz Fonckert was born about 1565 at Rhoon, at that time an important town on the north side of the Oude Maas. Draining of the Hoeksche Waard began in the mid-1500s. Dirck probably moved into the house on the Smidsweg sometime after the reformation when the monks left Westmaas. In 1622, he was appointed dijkgraaf of the Westmaas-Nieuwland polder.

The Iowa Fonkerts are descended from Dirck and his first wife, Bastiaentje Zegers Cranendonck. Their son, Seegert, born about 1600, started the drift of the Fonkerts a few miles west. He farmed in the Nieuwland and Zuid Beijerland polders.






### Death Records for 1764 to 1811 are missing...



...so, the inscription on the bottom of the baptismal bowl is the only record of the deaths of Rokus and Neeltje.

Our immigrant grandfather, Pieter Fonkert, was a grandson of Barbara Schelling, one of the twins baptized in 1787. Pieter was born and baptized at Klaaswaal in 1845. He immigrated to Pella, Iowa, in 1870. His younger brother, Wouter, followed in 1874. Pieter married Neeltje Toom in Pella.

Neeltje died shortly after the birth of Jan (John) Fonkert in 1877. Pieter remarried to Aaltje van 't Hof. The Fonkerts moved to Sioux County in the 1880s.




